On Monday, September 11th, the Preston community will offer special prayers for those who were directly or indirectly impacted by the tragic events of 9/11.

The Co-Curricular Fair was held on Friday, September 22nd, where students will check out the after-school activities available here and sign up according to their interests. This summer, students from the Preston Program were **Scholars** given opportunity to travel to Berlin, London, and Japan, thanks to a generous donation from a Preston alumna.



Students in Japan, where they not only immersed themselves in the history and culture of Japan, but also learned about medicine and cybernetics, visited an interactive museum to better appreciate the art, visited the Yamanashi Prefectural Maglev Exhibition Center to experience what it feels like to float on air, and even made their own sushi rolls!

Students in Berlin, Germany, where they participated in EF Tours' Global Leadership Summit on sustainability. Our students worked alongside students from all over the world to create a prototype that can help them build a more environmentally friendly world. PARKING PROHIBITIONS

Parking in the bus stop or double parking in front of the school is strictly prohibited! We ask our parents to park up the block or on one of the side streets close to Preston.

There have been far too many close calls in front of the school at dismissal time. Parents: PLEASE be considerate of our students, our neighbors and other drivers when you pick up your daughters. We will get Parking Enforcement Officers involved if we have to.

SMOKING PROHIBITIONS

FYI: NYC/NYS Smoking Laws Affecting Schools

As part of its Smoke-Free Air Act, NYC Administrative Code:

- Section 17-503(d) prohibits smoking in "all indoor and outdoor areas of...all public and private pre-primary, primary and secondary schools providing instruction for students at or below the 12th grade level, and any vehicles owned, operated or leased by such schools which are used to transport such students or the personnel of such schools"
- NYC Board of Health's administrative tribunal can impose penalties ranging from \$200 to \$2,000 for employer-type violations, and \$100 to a person smoking in prohibited areas

NYS law:

- Prohibits smoking within 100 feet of school premises. Employees and visitors to PHS
 may not use any tobacco products within 100 feet of our campus, as defined by the gates
 and fences that surround our property.
- Another NYS law prohibits the sale of e-cigarettes to minors.
