ADAPP is the school-based student assistance program within the Department of Education of the Archdiocese of New York. Our school is very fortunate to have a counselor and the service.

The ADAPP counselor will be available 4 days per week. The service includes drug and alcohol prevention education, crisis intervention, as well as group and individual educational counseling. The purpose of the program is to help students develop positive life skills and foster healthy life choices. We would also like to announce that we have added a part-time Math/Science SETSS teacher, Maryann Nagelee, who will be joining our full-time SETSS provider, Celeste Shanahan, in our learning center.

PRESTON HAPPENINGS

Preston Remembers

On Wednesday, September 11th, the Preston community will offer special prayers for those who were directly or indirectly impacted by the tragic events of 9/11.

The **Co-Curricular Fair** was held on, September 20th, where students checked out the after-school activities available here and sign up according to their interests. It is possible that some Freshmen may initially "overbook" themselves, but eventually they will realize what they can reasonably commit to and make more permanent choices. Co-curricular activities are such an essential part of school life and personal development that all students should be engaged in at least one after-school activity. As there are many to choose from, we trust that every student will find something to satisfy her interests. Students are also invited to propose new activities.

This past summer, Ms. Wolovich and 11 students from the Preston Scholars Program traveled with EF Tours to the Azores, an archipelago of volcanic islands belonging to

Portugal. The Azores are known for their volcanic origins and dramatic landscapes. This trip focused around just that! To learn more about volcanic activity, students gained an understanding of the islands' origins with professors of Geology at the sismovolcanologic center to visits at the Gruta do Carvao, the longest lava tunnels on the main island of Sao Miguel. Students also collected water samples at the University of the Azores to study phytoplankton and their purpose in our ecosystems. To students' delight, they also went whale watching with local guides and were able to witness five different species of fish (from sperm whales to bottlenose dolphins) who are integral to the island's environment. Whether it was coastline walks to discover geological patterns or dips in natural, thermal pools, students thoroughly enjoyed their opportunity to learn, gain a cultural understanding of a new place, and form tighter bonds with their classmates. These PSP trips have been instrumental in broadening our students' worldviews and their educational horizons"









Another of our students, Junior Iris Rodriguez, had an incredible opportunity to intern in the Brooklyn District Attorney's office this Summer. Iris, who started and is the President of Preston's Future Lawyers club was thrilled to be interning in the field that she is passionate about.

PARKING PROHIBITIONS

Parking in the bus stop or double parking in front of the school is strictly prohibited! We ask our parents to park up the block or on one of the side streets close to Preston. There have been far too many close calls in front of the school at dismissal time. Parents: PLEASE be considerate of our students, our neighbors and other drivers when you pick up your daughters. We will get Parking Enforcement Officers involved if we have to.

SMOKING PROHIBITIONS

FYI: NYC/NYS Smoking Laws Affecting Schools

As part of its Smoke-Free Air Act, NYC Administrative Code:

- Section 17-503(d) prohibits smoking in "all indoor and outdoor areas of...all public and private pre-primary, primary and secondary schools providing instruction for students at or below the 12th grade level, and any vehicles owned, operated or leased by such schools which are used to transport such students or the personnel of such schools"
- NYC Board of Health's administrative tribunal can impose penalties ranging from \$200 to \$2,000 for employer-type violations, and \$100 to a person smoking in prohibited areas

NYS law:

- Prohibits smoking within 100 feet of school premises. Employees and visitors to PHS
 may not use any tobacco products within 100 feet of our campus, as defined by the gates
 and fences that surround our property.
- Another NYS law prohibits the sale of e-cigarettes to minors.
