



Dear Preston Family and Friends,

On Saturday, June 5, 2021, Preston staged its 71st Commencement Exercises in our sun-filled backyard. Fortunately, the limits on the size of outdoor gatherings had been raised enough to accommodate the 125 members of the Class of 2021 and their parents, plus Preston's administration, faculty and members of the Board of Trustees. And thanks to the technical expertise of several of our teachers, we were able to live stream the ceremony to our graduates' extended families and friends.

The Class of 2021 has much to be proud of. Collectively, they have earned more than \$25 million dollars in scholarships and grants, and two members of the class earned over \$1 million each in scholarship and grant awards from the colleges to which they applied. While 39% of the class earned Regents Diplomas, over 60% earned Regents Diplomas with Advanced Designation, and 6.4% of those students earned Advanced Designation with Honors, while 10.8% of our graduates were recognized for Mastery of Math and/or Science as well.

Perhaps an even greater achievement worth noting is the development of resilience and flexibility that enabled our newest alumnae to persevere in their studies, while adapting to changing learning environments and class schedules. These qualities will certainly help them as they head off to college and future careers.

I would be remiss if I did not pay tribute to our dedicated faculty, staff, and my administrative colleagues for their creativity, adaptability, and dedication as we worked together to develop a workable reopening plan last summer that met the requirements of the Archdiocese, the Department of Health, and the Department of Education. It was no easy task to be able to teach in two different learning/teaching environments simultaneously, while trying to master new technology. Their empathy and concern for our students was remarkable. Our maintenance staff, too, deserves recognition for working tirelessly to keep our facilities not just clean, but sanitized, for the safety of all of us.

We were saddened when members of our Preston community fell ill with COVID and prayed for their quick recovery. We grieved when we learned of the passing of family members due to COVID and prayed for the repose of their souls and the comfort of those whom they left behind. The Religious of the Divine Compassion (RDC), our sponsoring congregation, suffered the loss of a number of their Sisters, including some who had taught at PHS in years past, and we grieved for them too.

Now we are looking forward, with hope, to the coming academic year when we can gather together, laugh together, learn together, pray together, and give thanks for simply being together again.

Dear Preston High School Stakeholders:

Last year about this time I wrote you with a heavy heart because the pandemic had already caused us so much loss, in the lives of family and friends and economic resources. And we were asked to isolate at a time we needed one another most. Even social distancing did not deter us from coming together as a group to assist others in their moment of need. An unbreakable will to survive and seamless compassion for our fellow humans in need are our greatest strengths and have dominated our stand against the pandemic from the start.

While each of us individually seems to have lost so much, collectively the burden is easier to bear. Preston High School, like many of its competitors, both public and private, has been beset with challenges that will continue to affect us for a number of years. Families' inability to pay, increasing out-of-state relocations, and a soft job market have become the major factors in our factors in our declining enrollment projected for September.

In response to the initial wave of the pandemic, Preston's Administration received BoT approval of \$20,000 in emergency tuition assistance (ETA) funds to defray a portion of tuition for its families most affected by COVID. In 2020-21, we continued to serve an even greater number of families with our own program (\$500 - \$1,000-qualifying family), and nominated and assisted families in their application for the parallel ADNY COVID-ETA program (\$700 - \$1,400-qualifying family), while waiving late fees and structuring tuition payment plans. We have not cut programs or resources; rather, we have added additional college-credit elective courses and extra Math 9 labs to address any deficiencies in math skills exacerbated by recent inconsistencies in regular in-school attendance. And for 2021-22, we have planned the most ambitious tuition discount offerings in over 10 years to serve over 70% of our students and make the case for the advantages of a Catholic education. A very generous donor, inspired by our commitment to our families, recently donated in excess of \$50,000 to enable

GRADUATION 2021



The Class of 2021 celebrated graduation in person on Saturday June 5, 2021 in the backyard. As graduates were given two tickets each, guest chairs were set up in pairs and distanced, with the event also live streamed for those who could not attend due to the capacity restrictions.

Once again, the class had a 100% graduation rate and acceptance rate into institutions of higher learning, both public and private.

We welcomed back five alumnae to present their daughters and granddaughters with their diplomas: Sheila Garvey '93 to daughter Hailey Badalati, Marianne Cappielo Porteus '66 to granddaughter Chloe D'Agostino, Melissa Paradiso Kibler '85 to daughter Jessica Kibler, Gina Cardinale Troiano '90 to daughter Alexis Troiano, and Lisa Viola Zollbrecht '91 to daughter Kayla Zollbrecht.

Alumna Sasha Panaram '09 was awarded the Distinguished Alumna Award by the Board of Trustees and delivered her keynote address to the graduating class of 125 students. Valedictorian Ingrid Alikaj and salutatorian Analisa Matranga both had the opportunity to say a final goodbye to their classmates in their speeches.

The Class of 2021 raised \$25,855,096 total in scholarships and grants! Two students were recognized as Million Dollar Scholars for being awarded over \$1,000,000: Margaret Varenne and Linda Melendez! Thea Tinawin was awarded the Corazon C. Aquino Scholarship from the College of Mount Saint Vincent, a full four-year tuition scholarship given only to a select few achieving students of Filipino descent.

New Initiatives & Scholarships

PRESTON LEARNING CENTER

In January 2020, Preston High School began working to develop the Preston Learning Center for the increasing number of our students who learn differently.

Other schools may refer to them as "students with disabilities" but here at Preston we simply refer to them as "our students." However, our academic and leadership teams understand that their learning needs offer us an opportunity to diversify our teaching approaches and that's why it was determined that Preston High School needed a program and physical place to meet our students where they are to help them reach their highest potential.

Research shows us that educational challenges are unrelated to intelligence, but rather are caused by differences in each person's brain functioning and other factors, such as stress, medications and our learning environments. We understand that our students are intelligent and hard-working but they simply learn differently. Our priority at Preston High School is to our students and to our values, which include dignity, honor, respect and compassion. These are the core values that guide the development of the Preston Learning Center.

Our school leaders recognized that a year of remote learning and personal challenges experienced by many of our students, in addition to the students who have documented educational plans and those who have yet to be screened, meant that our students would need us to be ready to meet and embrace their challenges as our own. All students need learning strategies and support to help them thrive. The good news is that there are teaching approaches, specially trained teachers, built environments and coping strategies to support our students who learn differently. Our plan is to make changes now, with additional

and extensive modifications over the summer of 2022. Whether students come to Preston with an Individualized Educational Services Plan, a Student Assistance Plan or are recognized by our astute teachers as needing extra assistance with their studies, our goal is their academic success.

Our Commitment: Better support for students starting September 2021

This will be a place for students in need and we plan on raising \$750,000 over the next 5 years to enhance student learning. May we count on you to give and stand beside our students? 
DANIEL T. HARTY SCHOLARSHIP
