First and foremost, thank you to our alumnae and community members for all of your continuous support. In-person instruction is ultimately our goal as we continue through this pandemic. In-person instruction provides strong engagement between students and teachers, students and their peers, and direct access to the full range of academic and wraparound services for all of our students.

This year, the Office of Academics made some changes to the curriculum to assist students as they continue to navigate school and learning throughout the pandemic. For incoming freshman students, Preston now offers Math 9 to ensure that

they have the tools they need to succeed in the coming years' math courses. For students with IESP, there are SETSS (Special Education Support Services) providers available five days a week to push into classrooms, small group instructions, and offer individual support if needed.

Office hours have also been embedded into the students' schedules to further support those who are in danger of failing. During this extra time, students are able to meet with their teachers one-on-one or in groups to go over topics and review material. Preston also works in conjunction with SUNY Albany to offer 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup>-grade students college credit courses before they even get to college.

#### ANAMARIE MURPHY:

l've worked for nine different financial institutions over the course of 22 years, never staying more than 2 or 3 years at

any one of them: I've been a reconciliation clerk: worked on SBA loans in the secondary market; CMO specialists (for those in the banking industry in the 80's yes, that CMO market); Supervisor; Manager; Cash Manager; Assistant Treasurer and Vice President. In as much as I excelled, using my creativity and critical thinking skills in each of these positions, I was not happy. I'd learn as much as I could and then move on because something was missing. I never felt like I belonged in the money-concentrated industry. Money wasn't my passion; it didn't drive my actions and — considering that I was one of 6 children raised by a single mother on the edge of the South Bronx – it was guite surprising to me and my family that I considered giving up my salary.

It took a family medical issue for me to call it quits and try something different. It was a series of events that ultimately led me to an interview at Preston High School. As soon as I stepped on the grounds, I felt like I finally found my home. These past 15 ½ years have been a whirlwind—to me, a sure sign that I love my job.

I watched around one-thousand students one of whom was my very own daughter, Lauren Murphy ('11)—walk through the doors as ninth graders and then saw them mature and graduate, ready to take on any challenge. There have been good times, extreme sad times and, of course, incredible times throughout my tenure at Preston. But through it all, I consider our students like family. I jump for joy at their accomplishments and offer an ear when they're upset.

I think back on all of our Preston events. the Haunted Mansion being one of my favorites, and while there's a great deal of behind the scenes work being done to ensure a great event, it never crossed my mind not to do it all over again the following year. Well, if I'm being honest, I absolutely second, third and fourth guessed chaperoning the European trips again. Think about it: chaperoning anywhere between nineteen to one hundred 14 -18 year-old students through Europe would challenge anyone. Believe me, the headaches, eye ticks and "OMG, what did I sign up for?" began at JFK airport! However, viewing the historical sites through the eves of our young students (again and again) never ceased to amaze me and I was so happy to be a part of their experience.

On the first night of a trip through Germany, Austria, Prague and Slovakia, there was a black out at our hotel and surrounding neighborhood, so we brought the students to the main eating area, setup flashlights, and came up with European Trip Jeopardy to help pass the time until the electricity returned. The students were split into teams and were asked questions about the sites they saw that day and the information supplied by the tour guide and were awarded points. It was such a hit, that we played every night. On the second to last day of the trip, the students were able to answer every question asked by the tour guides. The tour guides were not only very impressed but delighted that they finally had a school group that was interested and well informed. The students were so proud of themselves and the seniors on the trip said that the entire trip was an experience to be remembered forever. That's what Preston High School is, an experience to remember forever.

### **MELISSA CASTIGNOLI '07**

I started working at Preston in 2014 as an Art teacher after receiving my Bachelor's degree in Fine Arts from the Fashion Institute of Technology and a Masters in Art Education from Lehman College.

## Preston Scholars Program

Preston High School recently received a generous donation of \$100,000 from The Myhrvold and Havranek Family Charitable Fund, made possible by alumna Rosemarie Havranek '78, to be used specifically to support students in the Preston Scholars Program (PSP), an honors program that encourages learning in and outside of the classroom, along with a service component. Students are invited to apply at the end of their Freshmen or Sophomore year based on grades. The application includes an essay and 2 teacher recommendations, with acceptance into the program also dependent upon course placement at PHS: must be in at least 1 honors or higher level Math/Science class AND 1 honors or higher level Humanities class each year, and complete 3 AP or Dual Enrollment courses while in the program. The PSP meets monthly as a group in homeroom and individually with moderator Ms. Jennifer Connolly once per semester. To remain in the program, students must be in the required classes, complete all activities, and maintain a 90 cumulative GPA.

In addition to maintaining several academic requirements, each member must complete an outside academic activity each semester, including essay contests, video contests, Saturday classes, summer institutes, and the like. In the past, Ms. Connolly has helped facilitate numerous opportunities for students in the PSP including but not limited to: a trip to the United Nations International Day of Peace celebrations, to the Museum of Tolerance to skype with a Holocaust survivor; and a meeting with Supreme Court Justice Sonia Sotomayor. Students have even received internships through the PSP, at Bronx Art Museum and the NY Historical Society.

Mrs. Jane Grendell originally had the idea to create the program when she was an Assistant Principal, with the intention of setting Preston apart from its competitors. As someone who believes in life-long learning, Ms. Connolly saw the program as an opportunity to both challenge and support Preston's highest achieving students and introduce them to the idea that education goes beyond the classroom. PSP students have gone on to attend notable colleges such as Dartmouth, Harvard and Columbia and receive admission into prestigious programs such as the Macauley Honors College, Sophie B. Davis School of Biomedical Education, and Gates Millennium Scholars.

So far, the grant has already been able to cover costs for one junior to attend NYU's High School Academy, 2 sophomores to attend a seminar on National Security at the Pentagon this summer and another 2 juniors to travel to London, England for 3 weeks in July for "The Young Doctor" and "The Young Lawyer" summer experiences from InvestIn Education.

### THE CATHERINE STENDERHOFF 10465 SCHOLARSHIP

The newly established Catherine Stenderhoff 10465 Scholarship, sponsored by Annmarie (Stenderhoff) Hawkins '78 is in honor of her beloved mother, Catherine Kellachan Stenderhoff. Mrs. Stenderhoff, a proud Aquinas alumna, valued Catholic education and worked to send her daughters to both St. Frances DeChantal and Preston High School in the Throggs Neck neighborhood of The Bronx. That was a very important value for Ms. Stenderhoff, and was much appreciated by her daughters.

The Catherine Stenderhoff 10465 scholarship in the amount of \$25,000 will fulfill its mission with the distribution of \$1,250 yearly to one incoming student for four (4) years who resides in the 10465 area. Each year, over the next 5 years, the admissions committee will select a freshman who meets the scholarship criteria. Five students will receive the \$5000 scholarship, paid across four years of Preston education.

The awardee will provide an annual letter with updates on her ongoing Preston experience. The \$25,000 will only be expended on scholarships for students from the donor's neighborhood of origin.

Created by the Anthony D'Abbraccio Memorial Foundation, this grant is awarded to a graduating senior applying to college to put towards college expenses.

### THE SALVATORE P. MARINO "BOMAN'S Bunch" grant — Emily Marino '11

The Salvatore P. Marino "Boman's Bunch" Grant was created by Emily Marino in honor of her late father to help a rising senior afford college visits in the summer before senior year. To apply, rising seniors must submit an essay about how the actions and decisions of their parents, grandparents or other relatives spoke, or speak, to their hopes for their children, how they've benefitted from their sacrifices and what they've learned from these examples.

### FRIENDS OF THE DIVINE Compassion Fund – Class of 2011

Five members of the Class of 2011 came together to create The Friends of Compassion Fund for a student as they enter their senior year. The purpose of this grant is to ease the financial burden of senior year. This grant will be applied to graduation and senior luncheon fees while the remaining balance may be used to help with other expenses associated with senior year, such as the Senior Prom and its related expenses (dress, shoes, etc.), or college application fees. To apply, students must write an essay about the life lessons they've learned while at Preston and how they plan to implement them in the future.
