



The Importance of Scholarships and Financial Aid

A donation to the scholarship fund allows Preston to recruit the highest achieving 8th grade students by offering full, half and quarter scholarships, as well as the Mother Mary Veronica Compassion through Service Scholarship for students who perform service in their community.

A donation to our financial aid program makes a Preston education affordable for so many hard working families.

Approximately 72% of our students receive aid in some capacity, whether through academic scholarships, service grants, financial aid or outside scholarships including but not limited to Student Sponsor Partners, Inner-City Scholarship Fund and the Columbus Citizen Foundation.



The revenue collected is not finite and varies from year to year, hence the importance of donations to the Annual Fund.

ON SATURDAY JUNE 7TH, Preston High School faculty and staff alongside the family and friends of the soon to be graduates, proudly watched over as the Class of 2025 became alumnae of Preston High School. While the weather did not permit for us to hold the ceremony on the back porch, we all gathered in the gymnasium to celebrate the newest alumnae. As is Preston tradition, we invite the alumnae mothers to present their daughters with their diplomas. Graduates and their alumnae mothers included Sophia Arciuolo, daughter of Helen Manessis Arciuolo '94, Victoria Malone, daughter of Jennifer Gesslein Malone '94, Kailey Siegmund, daughter of Jill McArdle-Siegmund '94, and Rachael Trosa, daughter of Linda Morani Trosa '85.





This year's Distinguished Alumna Award was presented to Yanette Rosario. Since graduating in 2014, she received a Bachelor's degree and two Master's degrees from Columbia University and is currently pursuing her doctorate in School Psychology from Fairleigh Dickinson University. She currently works as a NYS Certified Bilingual School Psychologist in the NYC Department of Education supporting the needs of students and their families as a case manager, evaluator, counselor, crisis responder and advocate.

Salutatorian Kailey Siegmund delivered her salutatory address, acknowledging that this wasn't just a celebration of their accomplishments but a tribute to those that supported them along the way. She will be attending SUNY Binghamton in the fall as a biology major.

Valedictorian Rachael Trosa plans to attend Mercy University in the fall as a psychology major. She closed her valedictory address by encouraging her fellow graduates to go out and change the world of frightening but enthralling opportunities by being the bold, determined, and openminded leaders that Preston taught them to be.

Although this class was comprised of only 73 graduates, they certainly made their mark on Preston High School. Together, the class was awarded a total of \$26,174,902 in scholarships and grants to colleges and universities across the country. Three graduates, Kayla Cerbone, Rachael Trosa and Kerina White, were titled Million Dollar Scholars by earning one million dollars in scholarships and grants individually. Two graduates, Janelle Murray and Lismary Pichardo, were POSSE scholars. One graduate, Perla Ocasio Vargas, will be attending the Sophie Davis School of Biomedical Education, a highly selective medical program in the CUNY system. Another graduate, Adrianna Zillito, received the Sr. Loretta Carey full scholarship to attend Pace University.

My name is Rachael Trosa, and I was born and raised in the Bronx, New York. I grew up in a family of many Preston alumnae—my mother, two aunts, older sister, and cousin—and am proud to say that following their footsteps has led me to not only a great school, but a home.

Throughout my time at Preston, I've been deeply committed to both my academic journey as well as my extracurricular enrichment. Over the years, I've juggled many Honors classes, as well as Advanced Placement and Dual-enrollment courses with more than my fair share of clubs, including the Crochet Club, Italian Club, Dungeons and Dragons Club, Preston Players, Chess Club, and more. I've also been an engaged member and dedicated leader of many prestigious societies throughout my high school experience, including the Preston Scholars Program, National Honor Society, Mu Alpha Theta, the National English Honor Society, and the Italian Honor Society, the last of which I served as President for this school year. In 8th grade, I told my mother that Preston would go last on my list of schools because of how much I didn't want to go, or so I thought at the time. My reasoning? "It was too close." If only that girl could see the person she is now.

Hello! My name is Cielo John, and I am a Junior at Preston. At the time of writing this, I am officially President of the Student Body, and of a few other clubs, Treasurer of NHS, and founder of The Fundraising Society at Preston High School. Although my titles are vast, I've only ever seen them as such—just titles. While they might portray the type of student I am, I don't think they properly reflect the person I am. I think the best word to describe me is "advocate," because that's all I've ever done at Preston. I am the one out of my class who is not afraid to go to Mr. Martinez and tell him

when something is wrong, or needs to be changed. I am the Junior Sister who always made sure my Freshman Sister was taken care of, had a friend to talk to, and made sure that her friends always had me too.

Most importantly, I was an advocate for the Preston community during the Preston Forever movement. The night that we received the dreaded email, I called 11 media stations and outlets making myself available for any questions or comments, and I woke up at the top of the morning next day to meet with these outlets and their big cameras and microphones, and I told them everything that needed to be said about Preston. It is a home to locals and girls from far, and a haven for young women of color in the Bronx, where many of us are often underserved. It's where girls come in shy and introverted, and grow to become leaders who stop at nothing to ensure their home is safe and sound, right where it belongs, the same way I did and the same way many generations of Preston students will in the future.

I didn't think I deserved to have a say because of my titles, I thought that I was qualified because of the impact Preston has truly made on my life. I was that insecure girl who thought she'd have no friends for all of high school. Those days, I never once thought of a world where I was outgoing, confident in myself and my abilities, and speaking with tears in my eyes, on TV to save the school that I thought I didn't want to go to in the first place. It turns out that Preston is the place where I was meant to be.

Although I'm writing about my experience in the Preston Forever movement as though it was just something I decided to do out of nowhere, that couldn't be further from the truth. I wouldn't have begun to, or even be able to see the movement through without my friends, but more importantly, my teachers, especially Ms. Eugenia Wolovich, Ms. Joanne Gannon, Ms. Alison Pepe, and Ms. Michelle Esposito. These women basically held my hand through the rough, whether it was giving me extra extensions on assignments because I physically couldn't bring myself

to do them, allowing me to step out of class to take a nap in a quiet place, helping me write my testimony for the NYS Attorney General, or even just not waking me up while I was asleep in class. Every little thing they did propped me up as I continued to give everything I had to the cause, and I truly don't believe that I would have made it through okay without them. Now that we've seen it through, I couldn't be more excited for my future at, and beyond Preston.

Although I'm still not sure of what college I want to go to or what I want to major in, I know that I want to give back to those who have supported me through thick and thin, and to people who need to be supported but unfortunately are not. Regardless of wherever I go, I know that I'll come right back home, giving back to the community that has rebuilt me from rubble, has repaired me when I've fallen, and all in all, is my entire foundation. Thank you, Preston Alumnae, for shaping my school, and for fighting to keep it. I hope I made you all proud in the fight to keep our home.

Attorney General James Saves Preston High School in the Bronx

Following Public Hearing, AG James Brokered Lease Agreement Between Preston High School and Bally's Foundation to Keep School Open for 25 Years with Option to Renew Lease

April 22, 2025

NEW YORK – New York Attorney General Letitia James today announced that Preston High School in the Bronx will remain open for years to come. The Office of the Attorney General (OAG) facilitated an agreement between the Sisters of the Divine
Compassion of the State of New York, which owned the property of Preston High School since 1947, Preston High School, and the Bally's Foundation of North America, a charitable nonprofit organization. The Bally's Foundation has purchased the property from the Sisters of the Divine Compassion and will lease the property to Preston High School for \$1 per year for the next 25 years.





ON FEBRUARY 25, 2025 shockwaves were felt through the Preston community as we received the news that the school would close permanently on June 30, 2025. The Board of Trustees, the President being Sr. Laura Donovan, RDC, cited "declining enrollment, financial limitations and aging infrastructure" as the reasons for the closure. The community quickly came together and was ready to use the virtues that had been taught to them at Preston to save their beloved school.

Social media pages were created, rallies were scheduled, and calls to news outlet were being made. This quickly became more than just local news. Politicians became involved and this became an issue on the state level. On April 8, the New York State Attorney General Letitia James held a public hearing for students, staff, alumnae and parents to share their testimony on the closure of Preston High School and its effects. After listening to three hours of testimony, the energy in the auditorium of Lehman High School was electric.

On April 22, 2025, exactly eight weeks from the day this all began, news was released that an agreement had been reached and Preston High School had secured its independence from the Sisters of Divine Compassion. The Bally's Foundation, the nonprofit arm of Bally's corporation, stepped in to become the new landlords of Preston High School. With this deal, Preston High School has a lease of 25 years, with rent at \$1 per year, with the option to buy at any time and first refusal. Now let's meet the alumnae who fueled the movement!

encouraged her to run for student body leadership roles, as well as her guidance counselor, who invited her to support early Preston Compassion Connection initiatives for families in Goshen, NY. These foundational experiences helped shape her future leadership and service roles beyond Preston, and it also created a deep sense of gratitude and obligation to the institution. It was her strong belief that other young women in the Bronx should continue to have these rich and formative experiences that motivated her to co-found the Preston Forever movement. As President of the newly constituted Preston Board of Trustees, she looks forward to continuing to apply the leadership skills that she began developing at Preston many vears ago.

When the shocking closure announcement came in February, I couldn't accept it — Preston had always been a place you could call home, and the students deserved to continue that legacy. Drawing on my public relations and communications background, I launched the Save Preston High School 2025: The Maroon and White Forever Facebook page and posted content day and night to counter misinformation and rally support. I partnered with Master Graphics, who generously provided hundreds of free Save Preston signs, and with the help of a growing team of supporters, we covered businesses and homes to get the message out. The Throggs Neck St. Patrick's Day Parade and the April Alumnae Reunion were turning points, showing overwhelming community and alumnae support. Those events proved that regardless of the outcome, our efforts were a testament to the strength and pride rooted in Preston's legacy. RTSWS VARDE PARTNERS

A group of ten Preston High School students visited the NYC offices of Varde Partners, a global investment firm. Coordinated by Rock The Street, Wall Street, the students immersed themselves in learning the art of networking, perfecting their elevator pitches, and considering effective follow-up strategies. 

YANETTE ROSARIO '14

Yanette Rosario was born and raised in the South Bronx, New York to recently arrived Dominican parents, Coralia Valdez and Victor Rosario. From a young age, her parents emphasized the importance of family, community, and education, which ultimately inspired



Yanette graduated from MS. 118 The William W. Niles School in 2010 and was awarded a Student Sponsor Partners (SSP) scholarship to attend Preston High School. During her time at Preston, Yanette was a member of the Preston Scholars Program, Student Council, National Honors Society, National English Honor Society, Spanish Club, and the Creative Writing Club. Her studies and extracurricular activities at Preston inspired her love for psychology, human behavior, and community-building. Throughout her four years at Preston, Yanette established strong relationships with her Preston sisters, who are still very present in her current life. One of the highlights of her Preston experience was being nominated and voted to be Student Body President during her senior year. It was meaningful because she was selected by her fellow peers, who ensured that she felt seen and heard. Her other favorite memories include watching scary movies during Lock-in, laughing too loudly during lunch time with her friends, and having impromptu rap/singing battles in the locker room. Learning how to craft essays, solving geometric problems, and studying Latin were some of her favorite academic experiences. Yanette graduated from Preston High School in 2014 and received a full-ride to attend Columbia University. With the support of her Preston teachers, Yanette was awarded the Gates Millennium Scholarship and Hispanic Scholarship Fund Award, which funded her college tuition and expenses.

At Columbia University, Yanette dedicated her studies to her personal interests and addressing the pressing needs of her community. Naturally, she gravitated towards psychology and education. During her freshman year, Yanette was named a Thompson Muñoz Scholar, which celebrates the achievements of low-income, first-generation students. In 2018, she graduated from Columbia University with a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology with a concentration in Ethnicity and Race studies. Before continuing her graduate education, Yanette took a gap year to work as a reading specialist assistant at a charter school in the South Bronx. This experience solidified Yanette's interest in serving and uplifting low-income BIPOC youths in the very same neighborhood that shaped her. Therefore, in the Fall of 2021, Yanette began to pursue a degree in school psychology at Teachers College, Columbia University. During her time at Teachers College, Yanette was awarded the Ted Bernstein Award, which honors outstanding graduate students in school psychology training programs, who exemplify the best qualities of a school psychologist and are committed to improving the lives of children and their families. In 2022, Yanette graduated from Teachers College with a Master of Education in School Psychology and a Master of Arts in Applied Developmental and Educational Psychology with bilingual certification.

After graduation, Yanette accepted a bilingual school psychologist position from the New York City Department of Education. She is one of the very few school psychologists that have bilingual certification in the district. As a school psychologist, Yanette works with culturally and linguistically diverse families by completing comprehensive psychoeducational evaluations, providing counseling services, and crisis intervention, while collaborating with families and educators to develop carefully tailored Individualized Education Plans (IEP). She is especially passionate about working with Spanish-speaking families and children with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD), and learning disabilities in order to support their needs. In addition to her role with the NYC Department of Education, Yanette serves as the Residential Supervisor for the Freedom and Citizenship Program at Columbia University, a civic education and college readiness program for first-generation, low-income high school students.

Yanette remains devoted to breaking cycles of educational inequity and investing in the next generation of leaders with heart, intellect, and purpose.

Remembering the RDC



SR. LUCILLE COLDRICK, RDC 1936-2025

Sr. Lucille Coldrick, RDC (Mary Compassio) a member of the Sisters of the Divine Compassion for nearly 66 years, died peacefully July 3, 2025 after a long illness at St. Cabrini Nursing Home in Dobbs Ferry, New York.

Sr. Lucille was born in New York City on October 29, 1936. She entered the

Sisters of the Divine Compassion on September 3, 1959 and made final vows on March 30, 1967. Sr. Lucille earned her Bachelor's degree in History from Good Counsel College in 1958 and her Master's degree from Fordham University in 1967. She began her ministry as history teacher at Good Counsel Academy and remained in that position until 1976. During that time, Sr. Lucille was also the Director of Novices, responsible for the formation of new Sisters.

Sr. Lucille was admired for her standards of excellence and professionalism as an educator and administrator. Under her leadership as principal of the Academy of Our Lady of Good Counsel High School (1978-1985) and Preston High School (1991-2008), both high schools were well-known for their academic excellence and the spirit of compassion that permeated each one.

Sr. Lucille had a keen sense of humor and a gift for public speaking. Sr. Lucille was gracious, pleasant and unfailingly polite. She had the gift of providing her undivided attention to whomever she was speaking with in any given situation. While 'outdoorsy' might not come to mind when describing Sr. Lucille, she once listed her interests as "running, cycling and aerobic dancing." Over the years, the running, cycling and aerobics did fall by the wayside, but her love of reading, music, the ballet and especially her love of the opera endured.

As we give thanks for Sr. Lucille's vibrant and gifted life among us, we remember in prayer her devoted family and friends, and the Sisters of the Divine Compassion, all of whom mourn her loss.



SR. PATRICIA HANNAN, RDC 1930-2025

Sister Patricia Hannan (Mary Aurelia), a member of the Sisters of the Divine Compassion for 77 years, died peacefully after a long illness on May 26, 2025 at St. Cabrini Nursing Home in Dobbs Ferry, New York.

Sr. Patricia was born in New York City on June 22, 1930, the daughter of Norman and Mable Ford Hannan. Raised in Port Chester, NY, Sister attended the Academy of Good Counsel High School (GCA). After graduating from GCA, she entered the Sisters of the Divine Compassion on September 8, 1948 and made final vows on March 6, 1954.

Sr. Patricia began her ministry in education in 1950 as an elementary school teacher in Elmsford, the Bronx and Brewster. In 1955, Sister earned her Bachelor's degree in Mathematics from Good Counsel College, and was assigned to Preston High School in the Bronx, NY. At Preston, Sr. Pat taught math for ten years, was the Assistant Principal for four years, and Principal for 16 years.

Sister returned to full time study in 1985, earning a Master's of Science degree from St. John's University and Pace University in Math and Computer Science, respectively. She also received a Graduate Fellowship in Computer Science from Pace University. From 1988 – 2002, Sister Pat worked in higher education at Pace University and at Dominican College in Blauvelt, NY.

When Sr. Pat had the opportunity to take a well-earned retirement in 2002, she opted instead to place her considerable math and computer skills at the service of the Divine Compassion Congregation in the finance office, where she served as Assistant Director of Finance. She retired only when she was unable to make the trip from the Bronx to White Plains, NY.

Sr. Pat was an avid reader, talented seamstress and a loyal New York Yankees fan. Sister's gift to her Sisters, friends and colleagues was an unassuming presence that was deeply appreciated. She was a woman of few words who spoke from experience and wisdom.
